## Provision for Pupils Eligible for Pupil Premium

At Dunstall Hill Primary we recognise that children face many barriers to their learning. It is part of our ethos that these are effectively and efficiently removed so that all children make good progress. An integral part of this work surrounds the use of our Pupil Premium money which is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for FSM (or have been eligible in the previous 6 years) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than 6 months.

In 2014-2015, children eligible for the grant received £1300. In 2015 – 2016 Children from Reception through to year six, eligible for Pupil Premium Grant, will receive £1320.
